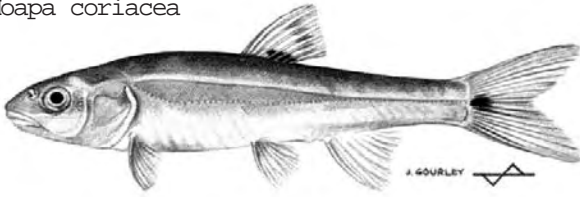


Moapa dace

Most people wouldn't know a Moapa dace if they saw one – which, considering it is endangered and lives only in one isolated area, isn't all that likely. **Zane Marshall** isn't most people. As an environmental expert for the Southern Nevada Water Authority, Zane works closely with agencies like the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service to

help protect the Moapa dace. To support that effort, the SNWA recently acquired nearly \$70 million in federal funds to purchase the Warm Springs Ranch, the dace's primary remaining habitat.

Why would a water agency go to this much trouble to protect a fish the size of your finger? Because managing regional water supplies means managing the environment that surrounds them as well and carefully maintaining the balance nature needs to thrive.

So when we say we're going to protect Nevada's environment as we bring an important new water supply to our community, we have the expertise and the track record to back it up.
