


Lake Mead

- Talking about Water Quality, Not Water Quantity.
- All things considered water quality remains high in Lake Mead and Mohave
 - Localized issues
 - Toxin producing Algae
 - Lower lake levels are not going to be helpful in the long run
 - Short residence time continues to benefit water quality in Lake Mead.
- Modeling of Lake Mead is becoming more important in considering nearer term conditions in the lake.




Lake surface elevation






Lake Mead Temperature





Lake Mead Conductance


October 4th, 2021 Specific Conductance





Lake Mead Dissolved Oxygen


October 4th, 2021 Dissolved Oxygen, Percent Saturation






Lake Mead pH

October 4th, 2021 pH






Lake Mead Chlorophyll a






Lake Mead Secchi Depth






Lake Mead: Colorado Inflow

August 19th, 2020 Temperature, °C







Algal Toxins

- Very few, low concentration detections in Lake Mead
 - Late summer months
- Fairly "consistent" detections in Lake Mohave
 - Most low concentrations
 - Most likely the product of aggregation by wind
 - Most in mid lake locations
 - Most recent detection was high
- This is an emerging problem that will need to be monitored







Model Results: Water Temperature

- 1100 ft WSEL (left); 900 ft WSEL (right)
- RCP8.5/late-century (2070-2099) scenario produces the most warming at L3PS
- Strong seasonal changes at 900 ft WSEL due to location of intake near surface
