- Budget tracked monthly by category
- Stabilization O&M deferred for two years while incidental take coverage is sought for federally listed bird species
  - >\$2M carried over
- \$300k reserve amount in the LTOP has been funded by unused dollars from FY2022/23 from non-stabilization programs
  - Escalated by 2.5%/year, to \$339k for FY2024/25



Yearly Average TP Concentrations in the Wash (2022 vs. 2023)


# Water Quality

- All sampling/monitoring programs conducted per their regular schedule
- 2023 data versus 2022
  - Se continued to be low (<4.0 µg/L) at most sample sites</li>
  - Perchlorate increased at the 2 downstream sites, but still < 70 µg/L at LW0.9
  - TP decreased at most sites, except for LW11.5 (urban runoff site)
- Data uploaded into database
   & displayed w/Power BI reports
- Move to Aquarius initiated

## Environmental Resources: Wildlife

- Record T&E bird activity:
  - Yuma Ridgway's rail: 7-2022, 6-2023
  - 1st southwestern willow flycatcher pairs and successful nest
  - Yellow-billed cuckoo: 2-2022, 5-2023
  - BA submitted; County process underway
- Mammal surveys:
  - Rodents/shrews
    - 9 species of small mammals; no shrews
    - Bats
      - Acoustic monitoring since January 2023
      - Most capture work delayed to 2024, but WNS swabs from spring were negative









Rodent species detected:

- Western harvest mouse
- Cactus mouse
- Brush mouse
- House mouse
- Desert woodrat
- Black rat
- Desert pocket mouse
- Merriam's kangaroo rat
- Round-tailed ground
   squirrel





Environmental Resources: Vegetation Management

- Revegetated:
  - 9 acres-2022 (last new site)
  - 4.5 acres-2023 (existing site)
  - Total 615 acres
  - Tamarisk down 99%, to ~15 acres
- Contractor has focused weed treatments on newer sites
- 2022 monitoring data:
   >85% of sites maintained or increased cover













### Environmental Resources: Cultural Resources

- The Programmatic Agreement (PA) expired in 2021
- While stakeholders discussed a new PA for O&M on Reclamation lands, they decided to address cultural concerns on a project-byproject basis instead









## Public Outreach

- Attendance of ~12,500 at mostly in-person events since 2022
- NDEP grants Green-Ups, 1/year, >250 vols; Mabel Hoggard, ~100 5<sup>th</sup> graders/year
- Other examples:
  - WWD >150 high school students
  - Las Vegas Science Fair 2023 staff interacted with nearly 1,000 people!
  - Hosted ~13.7k unique visitors to Ivwash.org
  - Reached >1,450 FB followers
  - Continued monthly e-newsletter




### **Lake Mead Surface Elevation**



### **USBR Predictions for Lake Mead Levels**




### Lake Mead Chlorophyll






## Lake Mead Algae

- The storms of late summer did cause some short-term changes
- First SNWA sampling following storm event found surface "blooms" of the species *Microcystis:* a potential toxin producer
  - Toxins were detected at the highest levels of the year
- Sampling by the City of Las Vegas the following day did not find the "bloom" when sampling the same area
  - Toxins only detected at some sites, near detection limits
- Toxins continue to be detected in Lake Mohave at low concentrations through the summer months.

# **RWQ Current Projects**

- Regression and Lake Mead Model (coupled) to study increases in flowrate of the Las Vegas Wash on drinking water quality withdrawn from Lake Mead through 2060
  - Conclusion: Projected Wash flowrates are not expected to affect water quality significantly through 2060.
  - **Implication**: Communities in the LVV can continue to grow, without negative impacts to water quality.
- Machine learning to investigate how phytoplankton dynamics may be shifting in Lake Mead
  - **Conclusion**: Overall, water quality and phytoplankton community structure have only been minimally impacted by climate change.
  - Implication: Continued climate change may lead to increased phytoplankton (especially cyanobacteria) growth near the Wash inflow. Many future directions for statistical analysis.
- Quantitative Microbial Risk Assessment model for the Las Vegas Valley (in progress)
- Lake Mead Model to continue simulating the five-year Lake Mead forecast based on BOR projections
  - **Conclusion**: Higher projected elevations of Powell and Mead show promise for improved water quality forecasts.
  - Implication: Continued "good" winters are crucial to maintaining high water quality in the basin.
